Park, who's known for transforming found objects into works of art and whose exhibition, "Reduce/Reuse/Reexamine," is cur-rently on view at Wave Hill in the Bronx - first turned his attention to bottle caps a few years ago, creating an eyeball-inspired piece called "I'm Looking at You" using only the handpainted insides of those bottle caps. "I put paint on the inside, and k looks like irises," says Park. "Not just brown or green or blue, but purple, orange, pink and yellow."

On Saturday and Sunday, Park will share his remaining collection of 2,000 unpainted bottle caps with families who visit Wave Hill, helping lead an outdoor search for branches, leaves and pine cones, and then bringing them all together with an

and whose recent works include a Queens public-school installation that features 140 multicolored bowling balls suspended from the ceiling Wave Hill is the perfect place to combine environmental education with artistic expression. ("It's a hidden spot. You feel like you own the place - a very secluded environment very close to earth,' he says.)

And when it comes to fostering that artistic expression, he finds children are the ideal students. They're much more curious than the average adult," he says.
